## Verbs: modals of obligation and advice



## You *should* be more careful.

I must do my homework.
I have to pay the fine.
I've got to go to school.
I should respect my parents.
I ought to work hard.
I'd better do what the doctor say

I'd better do what the doctor says. I shouldn't smoke.
I mustn't steal.

I have no choice. (often suggests obligation felt by the speaker) I have no choice. (often suggests obligation imposed by others)

I have no choice. (usually more informal)
It is a good thing, but depends on me.
It is a good thing, but depends on me.

It is a good thing. (normally used for specific rather than general ideas)

It is a bad thing, but depends on me.

I have no choice.
